Justice for Fentanyl Victims

Investigate all medication & drug toxicity deaths as homicides immediately. Include on-scene witnesses, cell phones, financial transactions via apps.

Develop NC statewide law enforcement training module & investigation 'best practices' for suspicious deaths involving fentanyl or medication/toxicity deaths.

Develop training module for District Attorneys and ADAs to consistently prosecute fentanyl homicides with GS 14-18.4 Death by Distribution
